LanguageS: Learning, Teaching, Assessing JALT 50 Years Challenges and Perspectives

“What a title!”, many may think. “Does it indeed need three parts?” Please take your time to read it carefully and digest. JALT is in the middle. Without this volunteer group and the dedication of the many, many, many teachers involved, this wonderful anniversary would not be happening: JALT in its Golden 50th, the 51st conference, TLT (The Language Teacher), the Post-Conference Proceedings, Chapters, SIGs, events, meetings, sharing, discussing and so forth. JALT is fostering and mediating processes and interactions between teachers, learners, topics, research, groups, and organizations. There have always been challenging times where differing perspectives are stated, but eventually we develop, evolve, adapt, even change. Similar is the role of teachers. They are mediating in the classroom, between learning and assessing, between textbooks and the classroom, between curriculum and the students. JALT creates a space where all this can be shared in a collaborative and friendly atmosphere so as to foster excellency for novice and mature teachers as educators and/or researchers thus reaching the theme of JALT2025.

Reading the acronym of JALT carefully, we see a “J” for being based in Japan; for language teachers in Japan. Yet, the “L” is often read as English, which Claire Kramsch pointed out in 2014. But which English? Well, American English, Canadian English, British English, Australian English, Singapore English, Global Englishes, World Englishes, International English, English as a Lingua Franca, the list can go on. English is without any question the most taught language on this planet. Before it there was Greek and then Latin. And in JALT, we have Spanish, French, German, Korean, Chinese, and Japanese. The line up of the words is important and has an inherent message – the perspectives of language learning, language teaching, language assessing, for languageS, for JALT, for collaboration.

Looking forward to the next many years, I see JALT prospering and growing older with a vibrant young teaching community in Japan reaching out to Asia. Many of the young teachers have a polyglot background, their heritage language being different from the language they teach, i.e. English being different from the language of the country they live and work in. Bilingualism, Multilingualism, Plurilingualism, Translanguaging, LOTE, culture, interculture, there are many aspects to be considered.

This is not new at all. It was envisioned in the very beginning of JALT and can be found in the *JALT Newsletter* (what later became *The Language Teacher*) in Volume 4, Issue 1 (1980, January 1st, https://jalt-publications.org/tlt/issues/1980-01_4.1). On page 3 of Volume 4, you can read in an interview with the at-the-time President of JALT, Thomas N. Robb:

Question: Inside JALT there are actually many different kinds of members. What do you see the organization doing to cater to their individual needs?

Answer: [...] Also in our general programming, we try to keep as good a balance as possible between the various aspects of language teaching, so that there are a number of programs each year directly relevant to each member's needs. Additionally, Doug Tomlinson, our new Vice-President, is attempting to set up SIGs for the members teaching languages other than English – in particular, French, German, Spanish and Chinese, I believe.

In 2025 we will complete the first quarter of the 21st century, the target for the SDGs has 5 more years left to go, among the skills the 4 Cs (Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, Creative Thinking), and various approaches are being challenged by the digital and artificial impacts in all fields of Learning, Teaching and Assessing. The 51st international conference of JALT to be held in Tokyo at the Yoyogi National Olympic Youth Center, offers a splendid occasion to share, discuss and look forward together.

Intercultural Competence in Language Learning: Challenges and Perspectives

As societies around the globe are becoming increasingly transcultural, there has been a keen interest in higher education to produce students who can function effectively in intercultural settings. Correspondingly, many universities situate intercultural learning as part of their strategic plans, promoting it through general education requirements, language courses, and study abroad programs. Hence, development of intercultural competence, broadly defined as “a complex of abilities needed to perform effectively and appropriately when interacting with others who are linguistically and culturally different from oneself” (Fantini, 2006, p. 12), has become an important mission of higher education today. Yet, many challenges and questions still remain when implementing this mission. For example, there is no uniformed agreement in definitions and constructs of intercultural competence. Methods and measures for assessing intercultural competence are diverse, making it difficult to choose one appropriate measure. Most importantly, the question on how intercultural competence develops has been under-addressed. In this presentation I will first review these challenges with a survey of the current literature. Then, I will present my research tracing students’ development of intercultural communicative competence (ICC) in an English-medium university in Japan. I will conclude my presentation with implications and future directions of ICC research.

Teaching Pragmatics: A Case of Japanese Speech Style

In this workshop we will discuss what pragmatic competence means and how we can teach it. Specifically we will address Japanese speech style as an area of instruction. Using interview excerpts and sample instructional materials, participants will create an activity for teaching Japanese speech style.

Naoko Taguchi is Professor of Applied Linguistics at Northern Arizona University where she teaches courses in TESOL and linguistics. Her research interests include second language pragmatics, technology-enhanced language learning, and intercultural communication. Her recent book publications include *The Encyclopedia of Applied Linguistics Pragmatics Volume* (co-edited with Daniel Kadar, in press) and *Teaching and Learning Pragmatics in the Globalized World* (special issue with the *Modern Language Journal*, 2021). She is currently the co-editor of *Language Learning* (Wiley) and *Applied Pragmatics* (John Benjamins). She also serves on the editorial/advisory board for 12 journals and book series.

Shoko Sasayama

Designing Tasks for Meaningful L2 Teaching and Assessment

The ability to communicate effectively in a new language is an essential goal for many second language (L2) learners. A key foundation for achieving this goal is the idea that learners acquire a language best experientially, by using it to engage in and accomplish relevant communication tasks (Dewey, 1938; Long, 2014). But, how should the tasks be selected, designed, and sequenced to support meaningful language learning?

Drawing on research from instructed second language acquisition and task-based language teaching, I will explore key principles of syllabus and lesson design that optimize L2 acquisition, with a particular emphasis on the design of tasks. A critical first step towards effective language lessons is to establish clear learning outcomes in terms of target tasks – real-world tasks that students should learn how to perform. With these goals established, pedagogic tasks can be designed strategically to scaffold learners towards developing the language required for accomplishing the target tasks. We know from accumulated research evidence that by changing design characteristics, we can alter the difficulty of a task and thereby encourage L2 learners to focus on different aspects of their production, comprehension, interaction, and learning (Sasayama et al., 2025). Effective lesson design also involves gauging students' learning through assessment tasks designed carefully to ensure meaningful progress. I will share actual classroom examples to demonstrate these key principles of syllabus, lesson, and task design in practice.

Designing Meaningful L2 Vocabulary Instruction

This workshop focuses on the design of effective vocabulary instruction as a way of fostering learners' ability to communicate in the second language (L2). Working with examples from the Official TOEFL Vocabulary Guide, we will explore learner-centered techniques for designing tasks, lessons, individual practice, and assessments that will support L2 vocabulary development. Participants will engage in hands-on creation of their own teaching materials that emphasize the activation of vocabulary knowledge for communication purposes.

Shoko Sasayama, (Ph.D., Georgetown University) is an Associate Professor at Waseda University, where she teaches Applied Linguistics courses and manages a college-wide English language program. Prior to joining Waseda, she worked as a researcher at ETS and as a professor at the University of Tokyo. Her research mainly focuses on second language acquisition, task-based language teaching, and assessment. She is a strong advocate for the use of research for improving L2 education in Japan and beyond.

Kuniaki Sato, Director, International Affairs Division, Higher Education Bureau, Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT), Japan, has over 25 years of experience in higher education policy development and university management. Sato was engaged in the establishment and management of a public university, Akita International University before transferring to MEXT. He has led the development of a variety of internationalization initiatives of

Japan, such as the Top Global University project, the Inter-University Exchange Project and formulation of Joint Degree Guideline and UNESCO Tokyo Convention. Before taking the current office, Sato served as Vice President of Tohoku University for reform and planning at Tohoku University, following Director for Office for International Planning and Inspector and Director for University at Reform at MEXT, Special Advisor to the President for international strategy at Kyoto University.

He has also acted as Chair of the Group of National Experts on Higher Education, OECD since January 2023. MA in Education, the University of Tokyo.



Kazumi Sakai is Professor Emeritus at Keio University. Since 2022, he has been teaching German as a foreign language and German teacher education courses as a specially-appointed professor at Dokkyo University. He has studied German language and literature, western philosophy and history of arts in Tokyo, Münster and Berlin. His research interests include plurilingualism, language policy, teacher training, and educational technology.

He has served for decades as an

executive member of the Japanese Society for German Literature and two terms as president of the Japanese German Teachers Association. He is also a founding executive member of the Japan Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (JACTFL) and the editor-in-chief of its journal.

Simulating Global Collaboration in Language Learning

How can we foster authentic language learning, intercultural awareness, and entrepreneurial thinking in a single classroom? This talk presents a decade-long virtual exchange project that connects students from Germany, Jordan, and Kosovo in a structured intercultural business simulation. German students develop startup concepts and collaborate online with peers abroad to explore cultural differences in markets, marketing, and social entrepreneurship. Students communicate entirely in English, navigating variation in language proficiency, communication styles, and differing cultural expectations.

The project is structured over five phases and culminates in a “Dragon’s Den”-style final presentation where students pitch their ideas, incorporating feedback from their international partners. Through this process, learners develop practical business English skills, gain insights into global communication, and engage with sustainability from multiple cultural perspectives. Challenges – such as varying commitment, or cultural assumptions – become powerful intercultural learning opportunities.

This session will share the pedagogical framework, sample tasks, and observed outcomes in language use, cultural sensitivity, and collaborative problem-solving. Attendees will leave with concrete ideas for adapting similar simulations to their own teaching contexts – whether focused on English for specific purposes (ESP), intercultural communication, or global citizenship education.

From Simulation to Skill: Student-Centered

This interactive workshop explores how student-centered simulation projects can build intercultural competence and language skills. Based on a decade-long global collaboration, participants will experience authentic tasks, reflect on cultural dynamics, and leave with low-threshold templates for designing their own accessible, meaningful projects. Emphasis is placed on student agency, real-world communication, and cultural reflection to deepen language learning in diverse classrooms.

Eileen Küpper is a Senior Lecturer in Intercultural Communication and English at the Language Center of the University of Applied Sciences Bonn-Rhein-Sieg, Germany. Her academic interests include international exchange, intercultural business communication, and diversity management. She actively develops summer schools in underrepresented study-abroad destinations and promotes low-threshold internationalisation at home to enhance students' intercultural competence, support inclusive student development, and broaden perspectives on global academic engagement.

Noriko Nagai

An Ecological Perspective on the CEFR: Conceptual Foundations and Pedagogical Implications

Despite the CEFR's global recognition as a framework for language education, its foundational principles – such as viewing the learner as a social agent and adopting an action-oriented approach – are often underutilized in classroom practice. This talk offers a reinterpretation of the CEFR through an ecological lens, drawing on van Lier's (2004) perspective of language learning as a situated, dynamic, and collaborative process of sense-making. By emphasizing the CEFR's conceptual rather than evaluative function, the presentation highlights its potential to support more holistic and context-sensitive pedagogical practices. It argues that embracing the CEFR as a flexible guide, rather than a rigid evaluative tool, can enrich language teaching and learning across diverse educational settings.

Bridging Theory and Practice: Task Design with CEFR Mediation Descriptors

This workshop first demonstrates how to apply the cognitive mediation descriptors from the CEFR to design tasks and scaffolding strategies for a project-based English course. The aim is to foster collaborative sense-making and enhance learners' cognitive competences by encouraging them to articulate their own ideas clearly and engage constructively with others' perspectives. Then, participants will engage in hands-on, collaborative activities to adapt selected mediation descriptors to their own teaching contexts. By the end of the session, participants will have practical tools and ideas for integrating mediation into their course design in meaningful and context-sensitive ways.



Revisiting the Case Method in Language Teacher Education: Student Teachers' Experiences

The 'casebook method', as used in law and business education, has been advocated on and off in language teacher education for the past 30 years. In this presentation, I make a strong case for revitalizing the case method in teacher education by presenting ways in which it can be applied to language teacher education and professional development. The aim of the method is for the teachers to read and reflexively analyze the cases with others in their own particular teacher education, teaching, and professional contexts. I report on findings of an exploratory practice study that aimed to investigate the experiences of students' engaging with the case method in two graduate courses. Data consisted of classroom observations, two questionnaires, and interviews with the students. Descriptive statistics and thematic analysis reveal a high level of engagement with the cases and meaningful learning about teaching, interculturality, social justice education, and teacher wellbeing.

Exploring Answers to Ten Tricky Questions in Narrative And Qualitative Research Methods

This workshop explores answers to ten tricky questions related to narrative inquiry and qualitative research methods in the field of language teaching and learning research. The questions come from the presenter's experiences of conducting seminars and workshops on narrative inquiry in many different contexts; from teacher education classes, to conferences, and workshops around the world. The questions deal with issues to do specifically with narrative inquiry methods, and also more broadly related to qualitative research approaches. Where applicable, reference is made to the implications the answers have for quantitative research. Graduate students, early-career researchers, and experienced researchers will find the workshop useful. The workshop starts with a brief overview of what narrative inquiry is in the context of language teaching and learning research. There will be plenty of time for further questions, discussion, and to share research experiences (of whatever kind).

His latest book is *The Language Teacher Education Casebook* (2025, Cambridge University Press).

Sachiyo Fujita-Round is a Specially Appointed Associate Professor at Daito Bunka University. She is a sociolinguist and has studied bilingualism in childhood for three decades. Since 2012, she has conducted fieldwork in the Miyako Islands, investigating Japanese-Miyakoan bilingualism. Her paper, 'Language Revitalization and Classroom,' appeared in "Languages" in 2023. She has collaborated on filming and documenting language speakers in Southern Ryukyus to inform the endangered languages in Japan on the YouTube page "Live Multilingually Project".



Matthew Cotter is an associate professor at Hokusei Gakuen University in Sapporo, Japan. Of Māori descent, he began his career as a primary school teacher in Aotearoa New Zealand before moving to Japan in 1999. He holds degrees in Māori Studies and Psychology and also has an MEd with a specialization in TESOL. His research interests include international virtual exchange (IVE), computer-assisted language learning (CALL), and support for indigenous culture and language revitalization.

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| Aim, Focus, and Research | A typical THT trip involves Japan-based teachers volunteering their time to go to a selected country and making two or three presentations usually on teaching techniques that are appropriate for the audiences. These range from elementary teachers to university teachers, with various levels of training and expertise. The one thing they all have in common is a desire to learn more about teaching. Traditionally, our teacher-training conferences, seminars, and workshops exhibit practical, student and teacher-friendly approaches to language education that are informed by current research in the field. Occasionally there are opportunities for volunteer teachers to observe classes and even teach a class or two. Volunteers normally pay for their travel and lodging while visiting the countries. Some teachers have also brought their family and their Japan-based students, who have also participated in the programs. |

The JALT Four Corners Tour

A Brief History

According to JALT records, the first Asian Scholar, from China, was sponsored by Kobe Steel in 1988, with 1990, 1991, and 1993 speakers from Pakistan, India, Vietnam, and Russia funded by the Yoshitsugu Komiya Scholarship Fund from the Catena Corporation. An item in the December 1995 JALT News states that “Since 1992, JALT has offered scholarships for Asian educators to participate in the Annual International Conference and share their experiences of language teaching with those working in Japan.” The 1995 speakers were from China and gave presentations in ten cities throughout Japan. There was a cessation of the tour after that for a number of years until it was once again revived in 2007.

Since 2007, seventeen invited Asian Scholars from eleven Asian countries have participated in JALT Conferences, with this year’s Asian Scholar rounding it out to eighteen scholars, a total of twelve women and six men. The Four Corners Tour hosted the majority of speakers with exceptions for the Covid Pandemic (online attendance) and schedule conflicts.


JALT2025 Postconference Publication: Call for Submissions


